NECC TO RECEIVE PRESTIGIOUS AWARD FOR INTERNATIONAL DISSEMINATION OF BEHAVIOR ANALYSIS



This May, at the 2017 Association for Behavior Analysis International (ABAI) Conference in Denver, Colorado, NECC will accept the Award for International Dissemination of Behavior Analysis from the Society for the Advancement of Behavior Analysis (SABA).

This award recognizes a person or an organization that has demonstrated a significant and sustained contribution to the international dissemination and development of behavior analysis outside of the United States. The SABA Board bestowed the award after recognizing our longstanding work to provide services, train service providers and students, and establish programs across five continents.

"The reach and influence of NECC are truly inspiring, and the success of NECC Abu Dhabi in particular illustrates the impact of dissemination; NECC has played a large part in making inroads for behavior analysis in the Middle East," said Maria E. Malott, PhD, CEO of ABAI.

This award is typically given to individual researchers. Of the past 21 award recipients, only one other has been an organization. This is the second significant award NECC has received from SABA. NECC received the Award for Enduring Programmatic Contributions in Behavior Analysis in 2005.

Acts of Generosity


Stephen and Allison Patenaude

Allison and Stephen Patenaude received their son Nathan's autism and global developmental delay diagnosis just two days before his sister, Morgan, was born.

Nathan was already enrolled in Early Intervention, but when the autism diagnosis came, Allison and Stephen began exploring other options. They first learned about The New England Center for Children (NECC) through Nathan's early intervention teacher, which prompted Allison to read about the program online.

"It really boiled down to the research. We knew they would be on the cutting edge of what needs to be done with autism," Stephen said.

In January 2015, Allison met with admissions staff and was quickly impressed with NECC's 30 hours per week of intensive home based training. Nathan was 2, but functioning at a 12-month-old level.



"When we started with home-based he couldn't sit, [he had] a lot of repetitive motions, no eye contact, couldn't point, lost all of his early toddler skills,"





Stephen said. "Julie, our lead NECC therapist, sat on the floor the first day, and he joined her and shape sorted with her."

As full-time working parents, they found NECC home-based services to be invaluable.

"In the first week he was sitting in a session for 15 to 20 minutes at a time. NECC really gave him those foundational skills back," Stephen said. "We knew from the first day we made the right choice."

The Patenaude's started a support group for families using Early Intervention services. They met monthly to talk about autism and other diagnoses, and discuss how it affects their families' lives. Once Nathan began using NECC services, they shared their experience and seven families from their group started at NECC.

Although Nathan used NECC services for only eight months, the Patenaude's are strong supporters of NECC.

"We realized quickly how life-changing NECC has been. [It] literally changed our lives for the better, especially Nathan's life," Allison said. They found unique ways to give back. With every real estate transaction Stephen closes through Century 21, he donates a percentage to NECC. They also support NECC's Annual 5K Walk/Run for Autism with "Team Nate."

"We wanted to raise a little bit of money and awareness so we started a GoFundMe page," said Allison. "Our goal was five hundred dollars, but we raised over five thousand."

In 2016, they hosted a fundraising night at Night Shift Brewery in Everett. More than 125 people attended, and they raised \$12,000.

The Patenaude's want to help ensure that all kids with autism get the services and education they need.

"Statistics are showing that autism rates are going up so fast that everyone is going to know someone with autism," said Allison. "It's something we have to figure out."

It's this passion and caring that has inspired others to support their fundraising efforts.

"We know we will always have NECC in our lives," she said. "It's something that's important to us."

Program Updates

e recognize the enormous need for quality trained Board Certified Behavior Analysts (BCBAs) in the autism field, not only at NECC but around the world. More than 1,300 employees have completed a master's degree at NECC and in 2016 we graduated more than 105 alone. Professional development is a key component of NECC's success. With on-site classrooms and faculty from Western New England University and

Simmons College, tuition reimbursement, and first-hand experience, our teachers earn their master's with a best-in-class education. Graduate students work with children with autism on a daily basis and contribute to ongoing autism research.

In addition to our master's training programs, 12 teachers have earned their PhD through a program established just eight years ago.

"I am currently halfway through my last year in the Simmons program here at The New England Center and am grateful for the opportunities that furthering my education has provided me here."



ECC has a long, fruitful relationship with The Eunice Kennedy Shriver Center at UMass Medical School.

Recently NECC Assistant Director of Research, ACE®, Chata Dickson, PhD, together with colleagues from the Shriver Center, published a report of their NIH-funded study titled "A sorting-to-matching method to teach compound matching to sample." The research influenced a new educational process at NECC to build compound matching skills in students.

In compound matching, the learner has to pay attention to multiple parts of a picture or word. For example, if a student is looking at a card with a picture of apples and a tree, they can often match that card to a sample card with apples and a tree. Add in other choices that contain the apples or the tree, but not both, and the matching capability in some students drops dramatically.

A 5-step tabletop-sorting-to-matching teaching procedure was used to teach compound matching. If progress stalled, researchers modified the tasks temporarily and observed student behavior. After



tabletop teaching, participants were retested on the compound matching task and accuracy improved to at least 95 percent for all children.

Much of the work in the research line with Shriver focuses on remediation — solving problems of learning in children with developmental and behavioral disabilities. Study results, such as those from the compound matching study, provide methods to fine-tune educational procedures if a

student stops making progress at a certain point in the curriculum.

"We, at NECC and the ACE, are committed to making sure that every one of our learners, no matter what, makes progress," Dickson said.

In the last three years NECC research staff worked on more than 130 research studies. The compound matching procedure will be one of many research-based solutions integrated into ACE going forward.

he ACE ABA Software System reaches more than 4,600 students around the world but it's not just being used for teaching children with autism.

At Vanderbilt University in Nashville,
Tennessee, ABA program director, Joe
Lambert, PhD, uses ACE to train future

ABA and special education teachers.

What makes the relationship especially unique is that the program was brought to Vanderbilt thanks to Lambert, a former NECC teacher who received his master's training on-site at NECC and then took those valuable skills elsewhere, helping to distribute NECC expertise and best practices to others.

"I was impressed with the way NECC did their programming and organized their curriculum," said Lambert, who uses ACE to teach graduate students how to progress from assessment to intervention. "Having these resources is amazing for graduate students."

We are thrilled when these relationships expand with the help of former NECC staff. NECC believes in sharing our knowledge so as many children with autism as possible receive services. By aiming to radiate out



into the world what we have discovered, learned, and accomplished, young executives and teachers who are starting services have the materials, the ideas, and the resources they need to be successful.



April 18

Team NECC Runs the Boston Marathon

Through the John Hancock Non-Profit Marathon Program, NECC had four runners train for and run the Boston Marathon in 2016. Collectively, Team NECC runners raised **\$50,453** for NECC!

May 7

Annual 5K Walk/Run for Autism

More than 1,500 participants comprising friends, families, and community members came together to support the NECC Annual Fund. This run not only supports NECC fundraising efforts but promotes autism awareness in the local community. In 2016 we raised **\$222,846**.

June 6
